

## Music in Schools/Settings: Autumn 2020

Following the announcement of the national lockdown from 5<sup>th</sup> November for one month, there have been questions asked about music in schools. We can confirm that based on the latest quidance (here) music, dance and drama can and should be undertaken in school so long as safety precautions are undertaken.

The full opening guidance for schools has not changed and can be viewed here. Therefore, schools can and should continue to deliver music lessons and to engage peripatetic teachers, including staff from Music Hubs; and the guidance highlights that 'all pupils should have access to a quality arts education'. The caveat is that everything needs to be clearly risk assessed with mitigating and practical measures in place. Each school will take decisions that are best suited to their pupils, the physical buildings, and their community.

To help support the delivery of music, all schools and Early Years settings are encouraged to take advantage of the TBMH's free support that every school/setting can access – network meetings. CPD, resources, and opportunities through our quality-assured partners.
